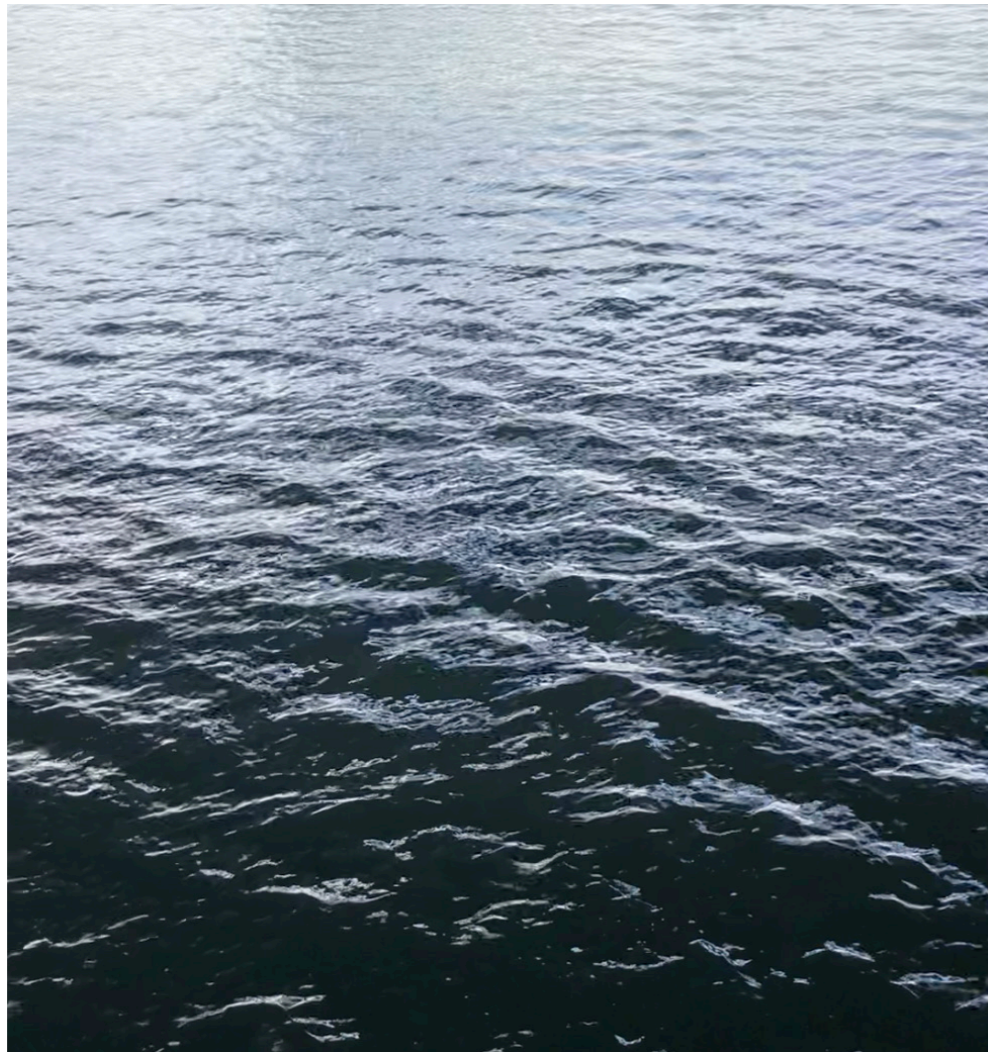
Iteration

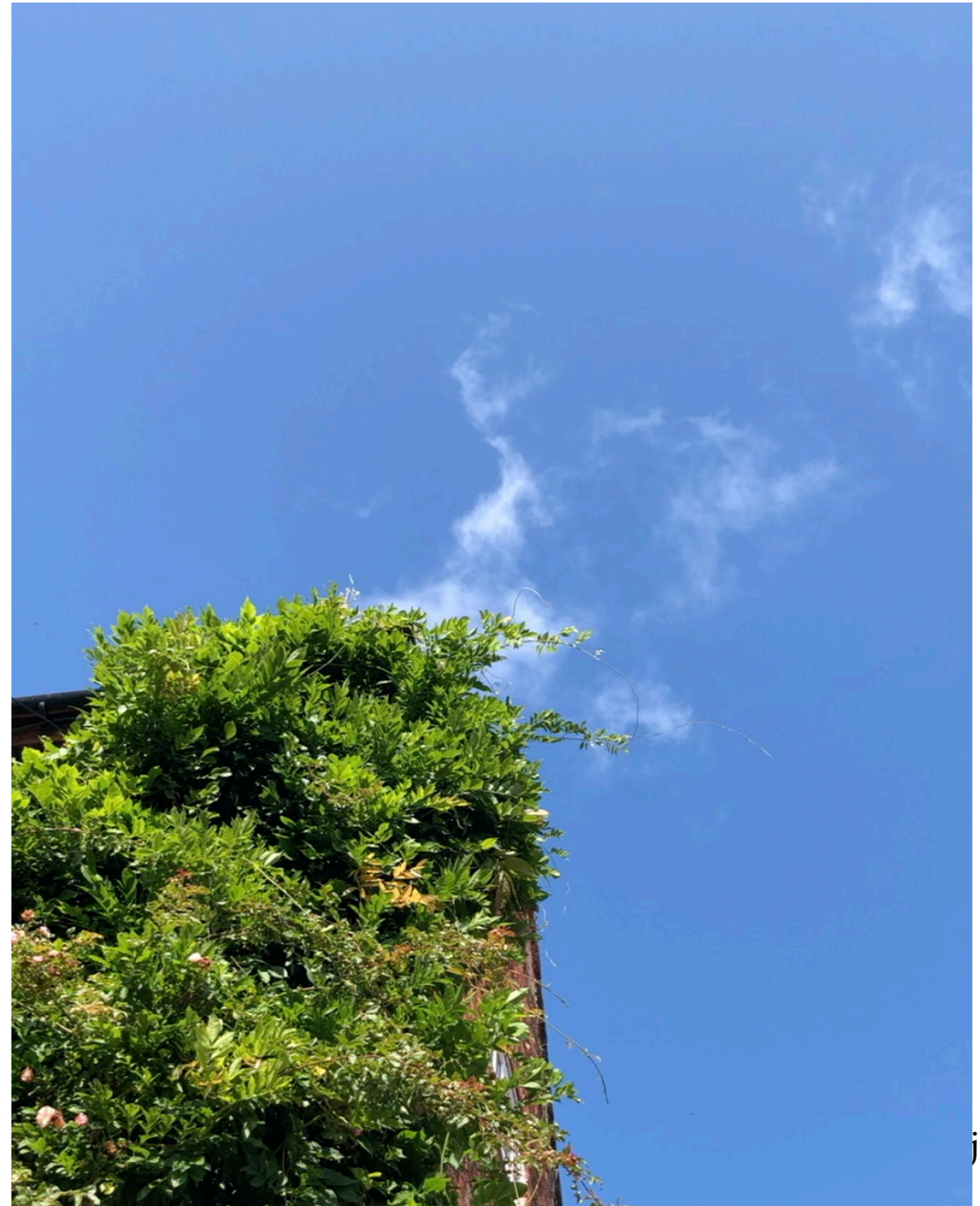
The pure collaging of audio test 2:

Due to technical difficulties, I am struggling to export this piece of work. I will make it available as soon as possible.



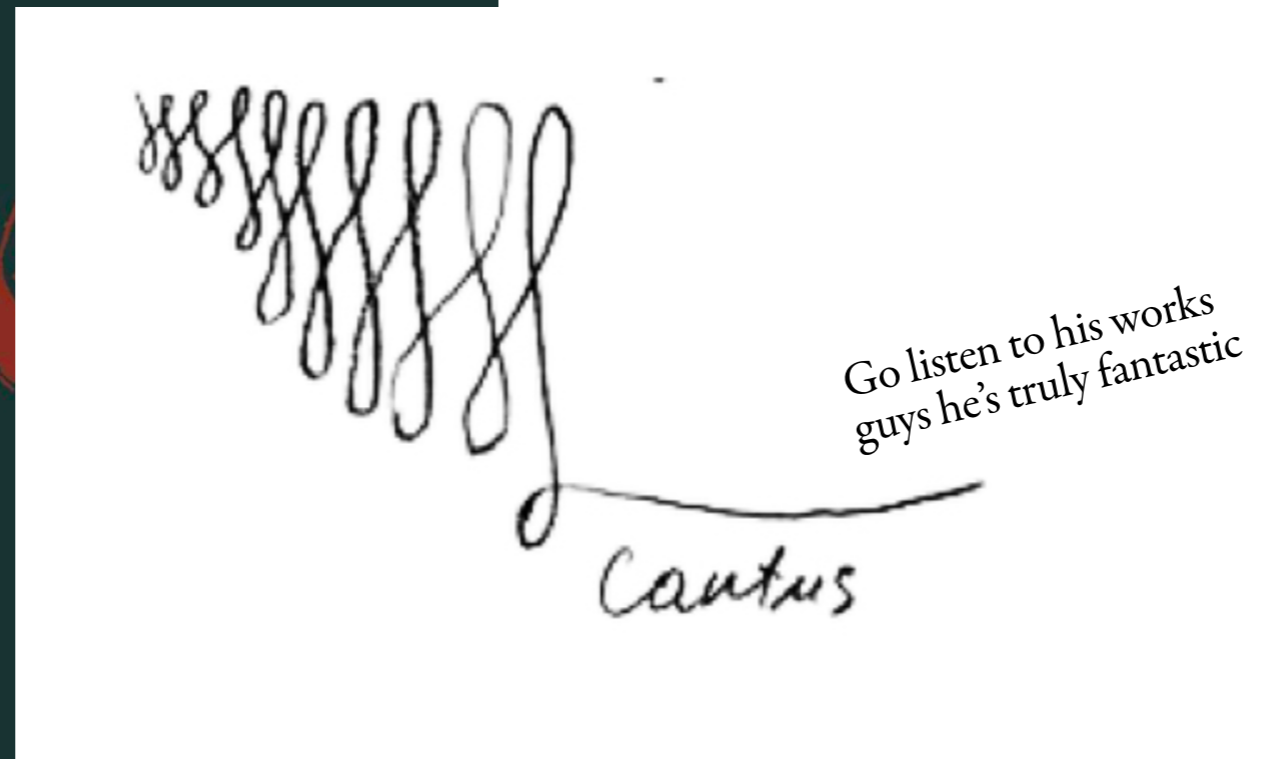
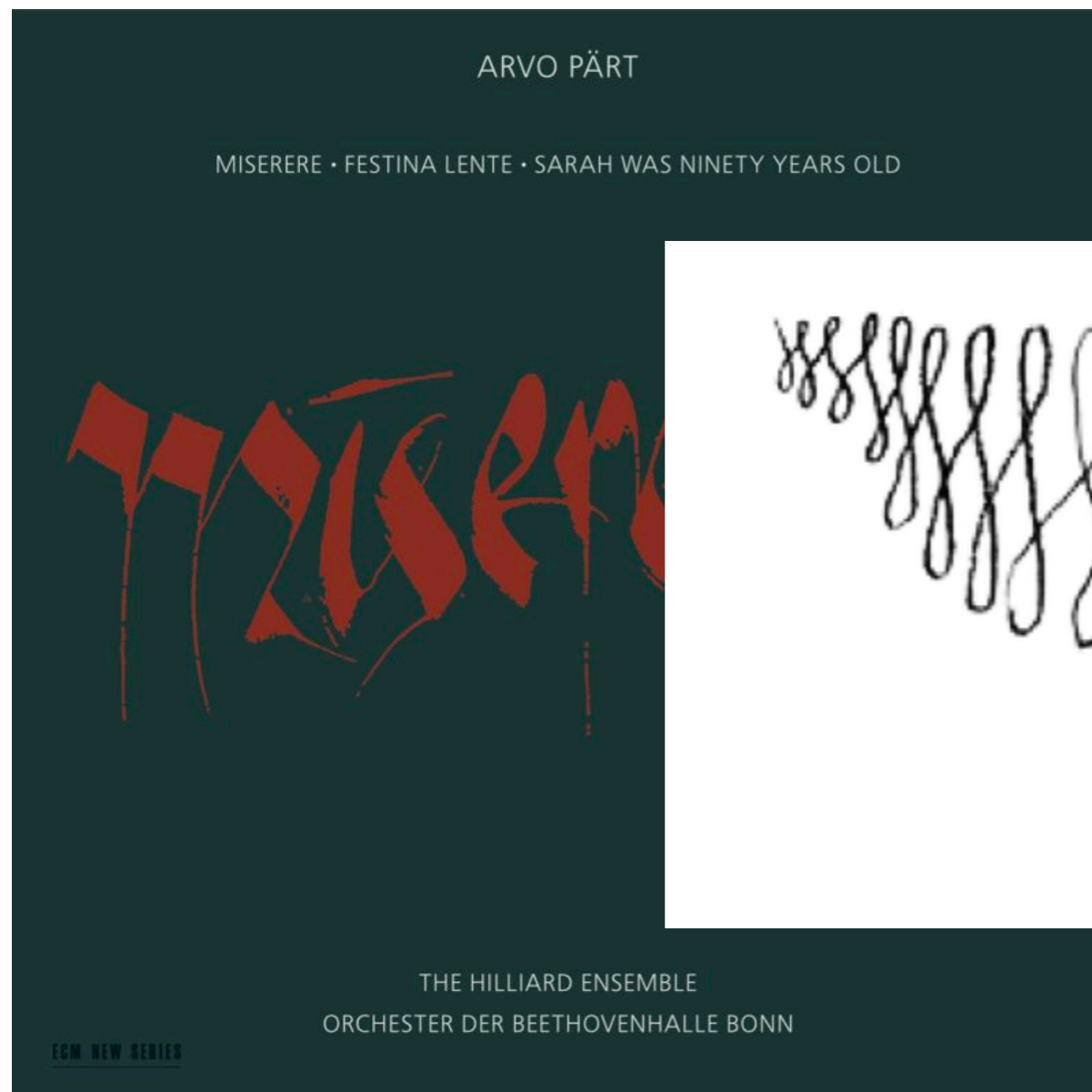
My favourite composor Arvo Pärt on composing, which, in my opinion, could apply to all kinds of creative works:

—

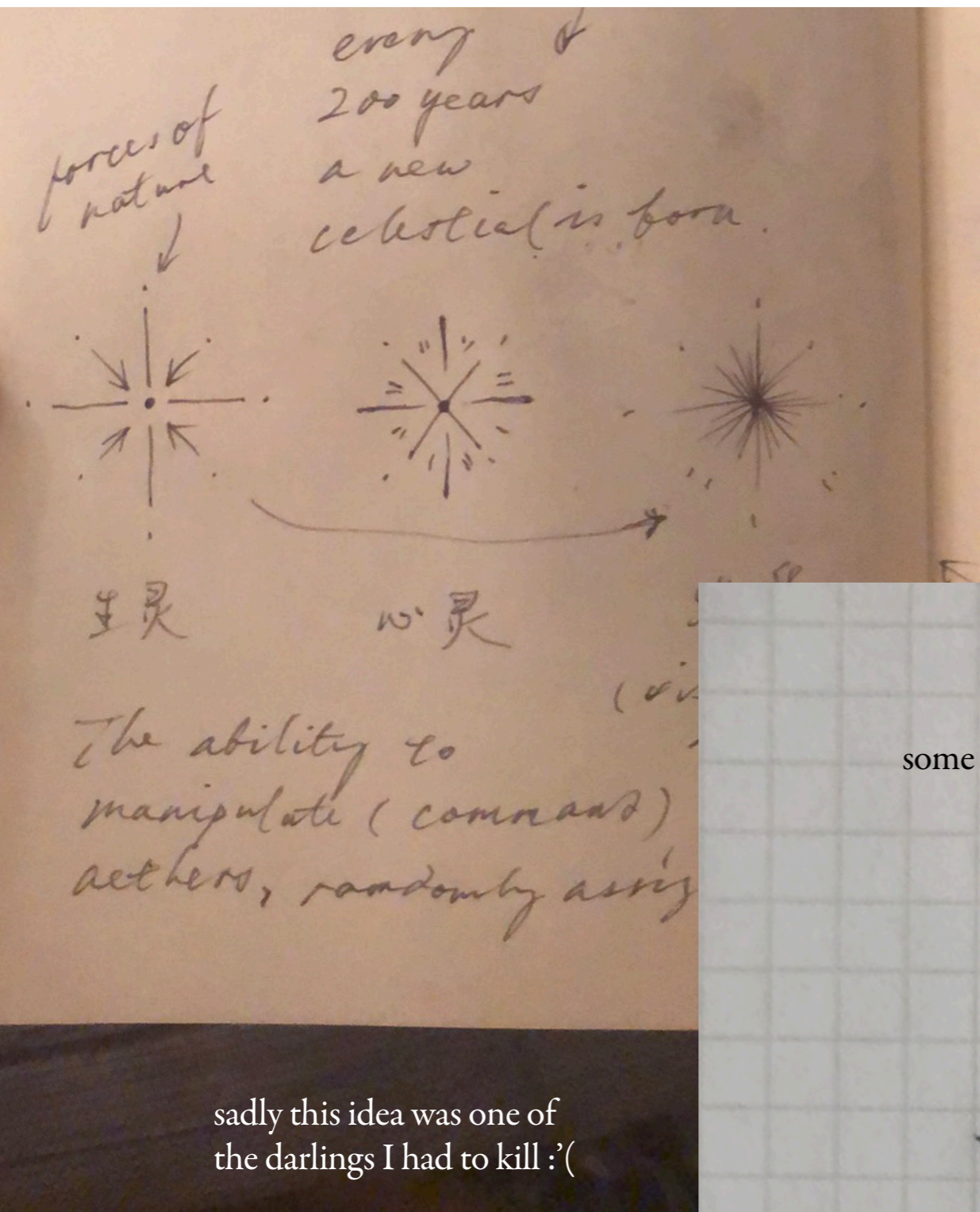
God weave human in their mothers' womb, slowly and wisely; music should be born in the same way.



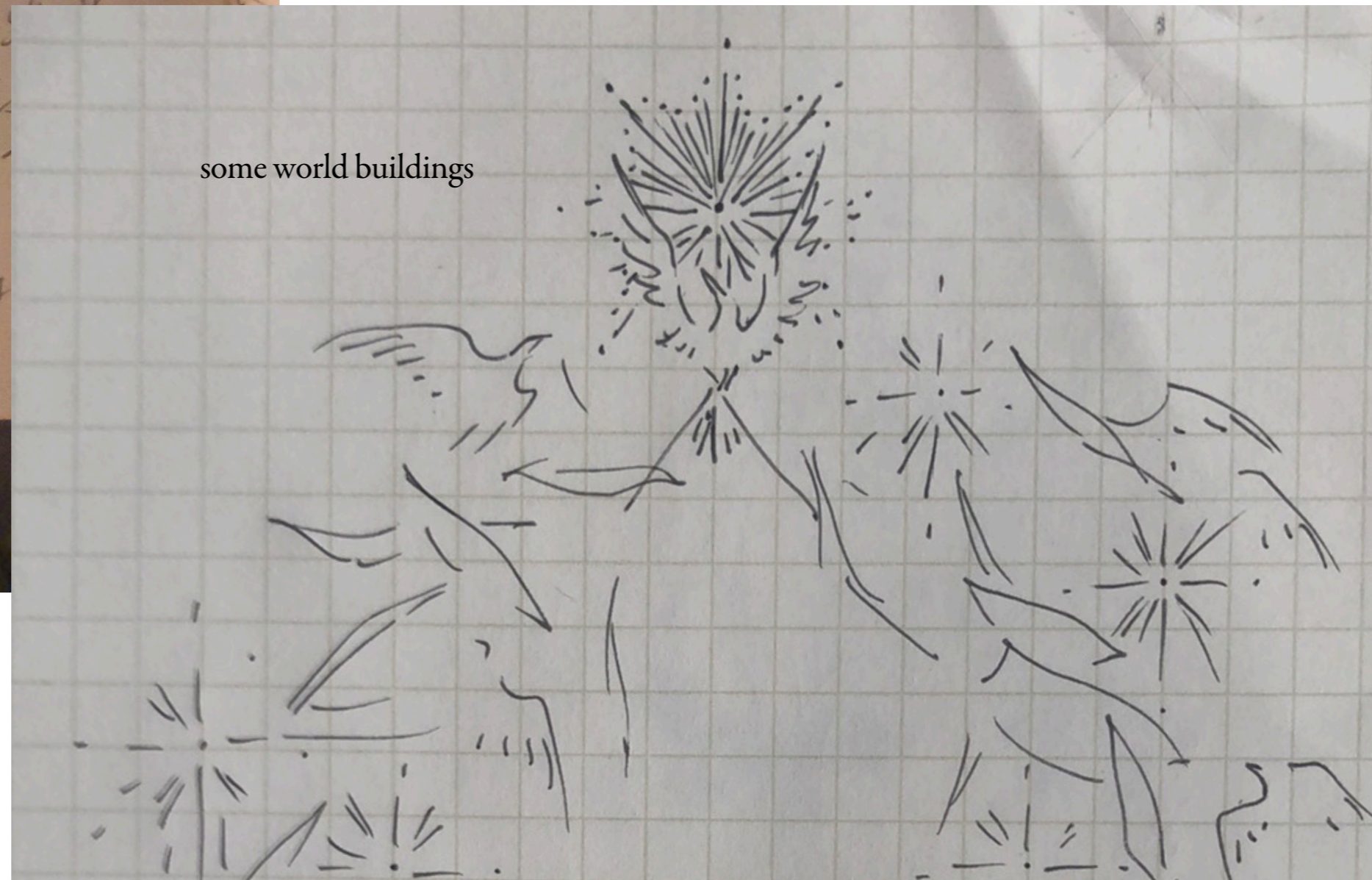
Creative writing. Here goes the keywords:
